

# District 2172 Kenyon Wanamingo Schools Parent and Family Engagement Plan

#### PARENT AND FAMILY ENGAGEMENT PLAN COMPONENTS

#### A. Parent and Family Involvement:

KENYON WANAMINGO ELEMENTARY SCHOOL involves parents in the development and revision of our school's parent involvement plan. We seek parental input during our annual fall meeting for Title I parents, through parent surveys conducted during spring conferences and in the goal setting each parent/teacher/student team engages in during fall and spring conferences. Each member of the goal setting team identifies and commits to an action they will take as part of achieving grade level benchmarks for their child. Kenyon Wanamingo Elementary commits funding to support family nights, parental involvement and other flexible services related to parental involvement.

The Parent Involvement Plan and School-Parent Compact are presented to parents by the principal/Title I coordinator in the fall of the year during the Title I Parent Meetings. The Title I Parent Meeting is offered at two separate times during the fall conference period and aligns with conference evenings to best accommodate parent schedules. The aim of multiple meeting times is to increase parent participation in attending the annual gathering. KWES designates funds to purchase Parent/Student Communication Folders to promote communication between home and school. Customized information about school calendar, academic and behavior expectation are included to help inform parents of school expectations and how they can support their child's achievement. An overview of the Title I program is presented to parents, including identification criteria, intervention plans, exit criteria and parent involvement. Parents give input about the plan and have an opportunity to ask questions they have about their role in supporting the work of the school and their child. The annual Title I Meeting occurs during fall conferences to streamline school visits for parents. It is hosted by the Title I Coordinator/Principal and Title I intervention specialists. The Title I Parent Involvement Plan is reviewed and survey results from the previous year are used to determine effectiveness and make changes. Agendas, sign-in sheets and parental input is maintained by the Title I coordinator.

#### B/C. Coordination and Integration:

KENYON WANAMINGO ELEMENTARY SCHOOL will provide the coordination, technical assistance and communication to involve parents in an organized, ongoing, and timely way in the planning, review and improvement of the school under section 1112 and the process of the school review and improvement under section 1116.

KWES will hold its annual meeting for parents of participating children during fall conferences. Parents are notified of the meeting through notices sent home by students, newsletters from the principal, school website, and notes in native languages to families for whom English is not the

primary language. Translation is also available to families for whom English is not their native language. Topics to be discussed at the annual meeting are:

- Title I Programming, its services, and parent's rights
- Participation in a Title I Advisory Committee / Invitation to join the Advisory Committee
- Explanation of the school's curriculum and Title I targeted interventions
- Assessments used to measure students' progress
- Assessment calendar
- Parent involvement policy
- Parent-school-student compact
- Strategies and suggestions for working with the teacher of their child(ren) to support academic progress
- Research based strategies and activities for parents to improve student performance. Resources are given to parents of participating students.
- Parent Resource library that promotes literacy, parental development and effective communication with educators.

#### D/E. Annual Evaluation and Revision:

KENYON WANAMINGO ELEMENTARY SCHOOL will take the following actions to conduct, with the meaningful involvement of parents and family members, an annual review of the content and effectiveness of this parent and family engagement plan in improving the academic quality of its Title I, program. The review will include identifying barriers to greater participation by parents in activities (with particular attention to parents who are economically disadvantaged, are disabled, have limited English proficiency, have limited literacy, or are of any racial or ethnic minority background). The review will also include identifying the needs of parents and family members to assist with the learning of their children, including engaging with school personnel and teachers, and strategies to support successful school and family interactions. KWES will use the findings of the evaluation about its parent and family engagement plan to design strategies for more effective parental involvement, and if necessary, revise its parent and family engagement policies.

- KWES jointly develops with Title I parents a school-parent compact that outlines how parents, school staff, and students will share responsibility for improved student academic achievement.   - KWES revises it school-parent compact in November of each year in consultation with Title I parents at our Title I Parent Meeting. All parents are given a copy of the compact through open house enrollment packets and it is explained during Get-Acquainted Conferences the first week of school. Parents are asked to sign and return the compact, signifying their agreement to work with the school to ensure success for their child. Students also attend the Get-Acquainted conferences and are asked to sign the compact as well.

- Title I parents are surveyed for feedback about Title I programming, school communication and support offered for their involvement in their child's education. Survey results are shared with staff and used by the advisory committee to make changes and improve the schools' Parent Engagement Plan.
- Get Acquainted Conferences are conducted the first two days of the school year. Teachers, students and parents meet to establish a relationship and review grade level academic and behavior expectations. This is an opportunity for parents to communicate special needs or goals they have for their child.
- Translation is available to Spanish-speaking and Deaf, Hard of Hearing families during the
  Title I meeting and also during all parent-teacher conferences. Title I and school
  communication is translated in the native language of the family to the highest extent
  possible.
- Teachers and parents have access to immediate translation via telephone and help with written translation with advance notice through the district membership with the Goodhue County Education District.
- Academic progress is reported four times each year, including Title I updates from the targeted intervention being used.

#### F. Parent involvement in the activities of the school:

KENYON WANAMINGO ELEMENTARY SCHOOL develops with Title I parents a school-parent compact that outlines how parents, school staff, and students will share responsibility for improved student academic achievement. We are invested in building a strong partnership with parents so all members of the student's home/school team are working to strengthen academic achievement.

- Get Acquainted Conferences are conducted the first two days of the school year. Teachers present and explain state academic standards to parents and students during this conference.
- Parents/students and teachers engage in academic goal setting for core content areas of reading and math during fall and spring conferences. Each member of the goal setting team identifies and commits to an action they will take as part of achieving grade level benchmarks for their child.
- Family Fun/Parent Education nights scheduled several times each year to provide education and fun for families centered on core content areas of literacy and math.
- Academic progress is reported four times each year through the use of a standards-based report card and a standards-based conference report.
- KWES is a member of the community organization 'KW Community CARES' which aims to align community resources to support youth and families. Membership includes participation in the Community Fair hosted the first day of school, aligning social emotional strategies to share with community organizations and facilitating access to free resources and/or scholarships for families. The organization has been part of helping create a "Volunteer Corps" at the elementary school and a Mentor Program at the Middle School of parents and community members available to regularly volunteer.

- State and local assessment results, such as MCA data, FastBridge Reading and Math data for comprehension and fluency are explained to parents at conferences twice each year. MCA data is sent home prior to conferences and teachers review the results during the fall reporting conference.
- A Title I meeting is held during the November conference period to explain the entrance and exit criteria of Title I, what targeted interventions are used, what grade level expectations are for Title I students and what parents can do at home to support their learning.
- The development of a "Volunteer Corps" of parents and community members who are invited to regularly volunteer in classroom to support academic work at each grade level.
- A Lending Library is available to Title I parents in partnership with our Early Childhood and Preschool programs. Resources include effective parenting strategies and strategies for partnering with school to improve their child's progress.
- KWES partners with Goodhue County Health and Human Services to offer a free flu clinic at both of our school sites during the scheduled fall parent/teacher conference evenings.
- Regular classroom and principal newsletters are used to communicate what curriculum is used in classrooms and how parents can support the academic standards at home.
- Targeted Services programming such as Knight Time and Jump Start Knight Time for Kindergarten-6<sup>th</sup> grade students help students reach grade level benchmarks and increase academic success during both the school year and the summer.
- Kindergarten Round-up, Mini-Kindergarten and 4<sup>th</sup> Grade transitional meetings help parents and students with the transition to the next level of education and support parents in fully participating in the education of their children.
- Support for parents in languages other than English is provided by the compilation and translation of key school informational documents; providing translators to assist with registration, enrollment, and parent conferences; and working with the EL department and bilingual staff members and administration to ensure effective communication with all stakeholders.

#### BUILDING CAPACITY FOR SCHOOL INVOLVEMENT

KENYON WANAMINGO ELEMENTARY SCHOOL will take the following steps to ensure there is effective involvement of parents and to help develop a strong partnership between home and school focused on student achievement:

- a. Paying reasonable and necessary expenses associated with parental involvement activities, including child care costs, to enable parents to participate in school-related meetings and literacy and math activities aimed at increasing parent capacity and understanding of academic standards.
